Putting Your "Yes" On the Table

One of the most difficult parts of serving in ministry in any capacity is the act of surrender. I know this is exactly how I was. I had little faith that I was capable, or that I was fully equipped for ministry.

In March of 2021 toward the end of the height of the pandemic, our church, West Tulsa Church, sent my wife and I, along with some other couples who had a heart for ministry, to the Pioneering Change Conference put on by We Start Churches.

I was not sure that I expected what this conference would produce, but I was willing to learn whatever I could to help foster growth in my church and my own life.

It was at that conference that my desire to serve was met with a challenge to put my "yes" on the table - the idea of surrendering yourself and seeing what could happen.

We left this conference with loads of information that would prove to be beneficial. We learned about different ways to serve, disciple, evangelize, and how to support and love people. It was at this conference that we learned different ways to change our methods without changing the mission.

My desire to serve in the ministry was growing; however, I held on to my "yes" because of my lack of faith.

Over the next year, I continued to learn and grow in my faith and attended PCC in 2022, where the main message was from *Matthew* 9:35-38 –

"35 And Jesus went throughout all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom and healing every disease and every affliction. 36 When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for

them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. ³⁷ Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; ³⁸ therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Our church decided that our mission for 2023 would be closely related to what we had learned at PCC the previous year. The message was that God would force us out of our comfort zones. 2023 proved to be the year that this mission was made a reality in my life personally.

In July 2023 at the NAFWB Conference, I heard a message on the final night of the conference that moved me to finally put my "yes" on the table. In August of 2023, my wife & I put our house on the market and surrendered to the call to go into ministry full-time.

In September 2023, our house sold, and an opportunity presented itself to us from an email that

came from We start churches. It was a ministry opportunity in Ypsilanti, Michigan. This was never a destination that was on my radar; however, I was sure that this was a direct result of taking that first step.

I was chosen for the position of Ministries Pastor at The Well Church Ypsilanti, and my family and I moved to Michigan in January of this year. This transition has been so easy, and I am so thankful for North American Ministries and all the guidance, encouragement, and support that they have poured out to help us minister to the people of Eastern Michigan.

It is wonderful what God can do when you surrender to Him. There are so many great resources and training available, but you must be willing to put your "yes" on the table. I ask that wherever you are in your walk of life, that you would all pray that God would force you out and use you for His glory.

Conference focused on Biblical womanhood


